



### confirmands' reflections

Ignorant was a typical image of me. I was an ordinary teenager, rebellious, stressed out for the crucial O level year and didn't have much time for God. Though I attended weekly Sunday classes while constantly being reminded that I would be 'graduating' from catechism soon, I felt guilty because I was supposed to have a strong faith foundation, yet I knew my relationship with God was strained. My confirmation camp came timely, serving as a 'starting point' where my journey with God began.

During the camp, all the ten confirmands were paired with a mentor. I had the honour of being my cousin's mentee. Throughout this experience, we were in the same sharing group. The sharing sessions included topics on getting to know ourselves, what does it mean to be in a relationship, knowing the difference between talking and communicating, being sensitive and responsible of our response to others, seeking forgiveness, building better relationships with others especially within our families. Apart from having to discuss about the topics as well as reflect on the reading material, I gained a new experience of having to facilitate my group in sessions. The confirmands and I also had a one to one session with our mentors. It was the most inspirational yet a little awkward at the same time for me where I poured out the struggles I faced in life to my understanding cousin

who lent me a listening ear. She was sympathetic to some difficulties I had and never fails to compliment me when I did the right things. In addition, she gave me diligent advises and alternatives to handle certain situations or how to improve a relationship. We had an enjoyable session together. I recalled her sharing her inner most feelings with me and even identified similar life stories that I am going through.

We laughed, we talked, however I would always be reminded of her telling me that among all the solutions she suggested, the ultimate way to lead a happy and better life was to build a close relationship with God. Through him all things are possible. Her words really struck me then and I was further motivated to strengthen my ties with God. The moment confirmation camp ended was the beginning of working towards my goal which is to be closer to God, not forgetting wanting to make amendments in various relationships.

"No Action, Talk Only" is commonly heard of today. Unless knowledge gained from this camp is put into action, the purpose of this camp would be aimless. Till today, there are still trying periods which I have to face daily, but with the constant reminder of my cousin's words, I would try to persevere in doing good, working on the relationships with my love ones including God. I am very thankful for all those who had sacrificed their weekends to make this camp possible, because without any of them, my fellow confirmands and I would not have experienced this life-changing event and feeling God's presence through the people around them. GOD IS AWESOME! ■

## Keep it Empty

The people at the disco pub will want to keep their glasses full and drink themselves silly; gratify their carnal pleasures; as they seek to fill their empty voids. But keep it empty - keep our souls empty for God. This is the message given by St Paul as he writes to the Philippians:

*"Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Because of this, God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." (Phil 2:6-11)*

By constantly emptying ourselves, we would be imitating our Lord Jesus and be at home with the will of God. If we are seeking true happiness, we would desire truth in our lives.

St John of the Cross, the founder of the Discalced Carmelites, prompts us to empty our appetites as we journey into God:

*"People, indeed, are ignorant who think it is possible to reach this high state of union with God without first emptying their appetite of all the natural and supernatural things that can be a hindrance to them, as we will explain further on. For there is an extreme distance between such appetites and that which is given in this state, which is nothing less than transformation in God. Instructing us in this way, our Lord stated according to St. Luke: 'Whoever does not renounce all*

*that the will possesses cannot be my disciple' (Luke 14:33). This statement is clear, for the doctrine the Son of Man came to teach is contempt for all things so we may receive the gift of God's Spirit. As long as people fail to rid themselves of these possessions, they are incapable of receiving God's Spirit in pure transformation." (Ascent of Mount Carmel Book One Chapter 5 Stanza 2, St John of the Cross)*

Are you seeking transformation in God? God certainly wants that for you.

Because as the passion of Jesus Christ the Lord drew near, he looked on Jerusalem and wept (Dominus Flevit - Luke 19:41) because it did not recognize that God's salvation had come. Being moderns in a high technology world, we have to be aware of the mistakes of those who had bombed by living squandered existence.

Let us also pray in faith and repentance the spirit of the Servant of the Lord: "The Lord GOD has given me a well-trained tongue, that I might know how to speak to the weary a word that will rouse them. Morning after morning he opens my ear that I may hear; and I have not rebelled, have not turned back. I gave my back to those who beat me, my cheeks to those who plucked my beard; my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting. The Lord GOD is my help, therefore I am not disgraced; I have set my face like flint, knowing that I shall not be put to shame." (Isaiah 50:4-7)

On Good Friday, the world will try to trick you with "Earth Day" but keep your entire focus on The Lord of the Earth and Life.

This Holy Week, let us decide for ourselves, "The soul that desires God to surrender Himself to it entirely must surrender itself entirely to Him without keeping anything for itself." (Prayer of a Soul Taken with Love, No. 128, St John of the Cross)

Yes, keep it empty. ■

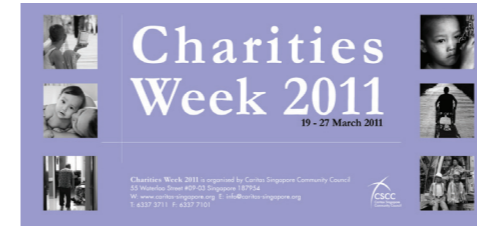

Even Peter who made beautiful promises to Jesus during the Last Supper was quick to succumb to the pressure, denying Jesus and hearing the cock crowing after it. How many could really stand by Jesus like the handful that went to the Cross?

In this complicating and rapid changing world, we've even gotten used to sin that we can't even hear our conscience 'crowing' any more! So much so that it makes me wonder if it's our sins that has inflicted suffering on Jesus and not the soldiers during the Passion of Jesus. I fear – fearing that each time I sin; I'm crucifying and nailing Jesus again and again. It's only when we realized and recognized our sins, then we'll turn to Jesus in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and ask Him for His mercy and forgiveness.

On the other hand, it's inevitable that in turn, we're constantly hurt by so many things in our lives and hurt by what we're witnessing around us. Thus, we'll learn to look at the Passion of Jesus to find the answers, healing and hope.

Are we part of the crowd that welcomed Jesus and quick to abandon Jesus? Are we like Peter who denied Jesus to save his skin? When we sin, can we still hear our conscience 'crows'? What have we done to Jesus? And, what have we done for Jesus? ■

## "Travelling TIPS"

For the past one and a half years we have been travelling much, especially to Singapore. And with God's guiding light, we chose a small hotel next to St Peter and Paul Church as our "home" in Singapore. While the new Apostolic Nuncio to Singapore Archbishop Leopoldo Girelli stays at the Catholic Welfare Services Building and thus making him a "true blue parishioner" of SPP, we consider ourselves parishioners of SPP too, albeit "visiting parishioners."

True to its small size, the rooms of the hotel are really small. Little space to put the luggage bags, little room still to move around. Out of necessity, we are forced to travel light, we were well known for bringing the whole house while travelling, but now... we have to travel light, but not too light.

Life is a journey, a pilgrimage. As a pilgrim we need a few basic baggage for our journey. Too many will burden us, too light will make life difficult as we journey towards our ultimate destination - Heaven.

Jesus told us very clearly the basic baggage we need to carry with us.

**Baggage Number One: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.'** (Matthew 22:37). For most people, it is quite easy to love God, especially when we are in need of this and that, or face with great challenges in life, we quickly remember our God and love Him very much by praying very hard to Him. But when the Church needs us to offer our services such as Choir, Warden, Sunday School, most of us will offer many excuses: no voice, no time, not qualified and so forth. Are we carrying the very basic Baggage Number One? Are we loving God with all our heart and soul and mind? If not, our luggage for our pilgrimage may be too light!

**Baggage Number Two: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'** (Matthew 22:39) We all know the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37), often we are blind to our "neighbour" in need, we only worry about ourselves, our own well being, neglecting those around us who are in need, some desperately needed help for food and shelter, or clothing, but for some, perhaps just a listening ear, a pat on the back. Often we are too busy going our own way, no time to notice them, let along "love" them.

One year ago, we spent 40 days at SPP, attending the daily 3pm Divine Mercy Devotion and the 5.30pm evening Mass. It was a retreat by Divine Providence. We were so Touched and Comforted by the Merciful Lord that we brought back to Kuching the Divine Mercy Devotion. With the blessing of our Parish Priest Fr Vincent Chin, St Peter's Church started the Daily 3pm Divine Mercy Devotion on Friday 18 June 2010 and our Divine Mercy Apostolate was launched with a Mass and Benediction on the Feast Day of St Faustina 5 October 2010. Ever since we started in June last year, we have been praying fervently and unceasingly, 7 days a week, even during Public Holidays, Christmas and Chinese New Year. Truly our DMA people have shown their love for God with all their heart, mind and soul. On the other hands, there were people telling us not to start the Divine Mercy Devotion, it would not last and it would surely fail. These people also love God, but not with all their heart, mind and soul. We can only pray for them.

Jesus tells us to do work of mercy. To love our neighbours, we identify people in needs and organize visits to their homes, bringing clothing, food stuff and other necessities to help them. Last year Advent we visited one poor family, this year on the Second Sunday of Lent (20 March 2011) we visited one desperate mother of seven children, aged 7 months to 19 years old, her husband is nowhere to be found, leaving her to fend for herself and the children. When 30 odd people visited her with toys, gifts, food stuff, milk, clothing and cash, she was moved with awe. We brought her our good wishes and sang hymns for her. We nearly collapsed her little hut which was overloaded with visitors. Truly we will never forget this Lent.

Travel light, but not too light.

We need to bring at least 2 baggage: **'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.'** And **'Love your neighbour as yourself.'** ■
